# Health care has regained 2/3 of jobs lost; still 500K below pre-COVID-19 level

## HIGHLIGHTS

- Health care added a solid 46,000 jobs in November, surpassing 1 million jobs recovered since February 2020.
- Health care employment overall is still down by more than 500,000 jobs, or 3.2%, from the February 2020 employment peak.
- By setting, only one sub-setting outpatient care centers is back to February employment levels. This category includes urgent care centers, outpatient behavioral health clinics, and community health centers.
- Employment in hospitals and across all ambulatory services remains about 2% below February employment.
- Nursing and residential care employment continues to fall, with 250,000 fewer jobs in November compared to February, a 7.4% decline.
- The economy overall gained 245,000 jobs in November, a solid gain but less than half the number of jobs gained in the previous two months. Just over half (56%) of the 22.16 million jobs lost this spring have come back through November. The unemployment rate fell from 6.9% to 6.7%.

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
## DISCUSSION

Health care gained 46,000 jobs in October, a strong month by historical standards, but continuing the pattern of slowing job recovery (Exhibit 1). While health care has regained 1 million jobs, or two-thirds of the 1.58 million jobs lost in March and April, employment remains 3.2% below where it was in February, with 527,000 fewer jobs.

While the impact of COVID-19 and the recession varies by setting, employment remains below pre-COVID-19 levels in all settings of care except outpatient care centers. This category includes urgent care centers, outpatient behavioral health clinics, and community health centers. Ambulatory care in general is down 2.2%, or 176,000 jobs from the February peak. Offices of physicians and offices of dentists are close to pre-COVID employment, with physician offices needing to gain 43,000 jobs and dental offices needing another 16,000 jobs.

Hospitals added only 4,700 jobs in November, and remain 2.0%, or 105,000 jobs, below the pre-COVID-19 peak. Employment in nursing and residential care continues the long pattern of decline with a November loss of 10,400 jobs and total losses of 251,000 jobs since February 2020.

The pace of job recovery in the overall economy is following a pattern similar to health care, with 245,000 jobs gained in November, compared to 610,000 gained in October and 711,000 gained in September. While more than half of jobs lost in the spring have been regained, there are still 9.8 million fewer jobs economywide, a 6.5% reduction, compared to February 2020.





Exhibit 4. Twelve-month Percent Change in Health Care Employment
